PUBLISHED**Generic Marking Principles**

These general marking principles must be applied by all examiners when marking candidate answers. They should be applied alongside the specific content of the mark scheme or generic level descriptors for a question. Each question paper and mark scheme will also comply with these marking principles.

GENERIC MARKING PRINCIPLE 1:

Marks must be awarded in line with:

- the specific content of the mark scheme or the generic level descriptors for the question
- the specific skills defined in the mark scheme or in the generic level descriptors for the question
- the standard of response required by a candidate as exemplified by the standardisation scripts.

GENERIC MARKING PRINCIPLE 2:

Marks awarded are always **whole marks** (not half marks, or other fractions).

GENERIC MARKING PRINCIPLE 3:

Marks must be awarded **positively**:

- marks are awarded for correct/valid answers, as defined in the mark scheme. However, credit is given for valid answers which go beyond the scope of the syllabus and mark scheme, referring to your Team Leader as appropriate
- marks are awarded when candidates clearly demonstrate what they know and can do
- marks are not deducted for errors
- marks are not deducted for omissions
- answers should only be judged on the quality of spelling, punctuation and grammar when these features are specifically assessed by the question as indicated by the mark scheme. The meaning, however, should be unambiguous.

GENERIC MARKING PRINCIPLE 4:

Rules must be applied consistently e.g. in situations where candidates have not followed instructions or in the application of generic level descriptors.

GENERIC MARKING PRINCIPLE 5:

Marks should be awarded using the full range of marks defined in the mark scheme for the question (however; the use of the full mark range may be limited according to the quality of the candidate responses seen).

GENERIC MARKING PRINCIPLE 6:

Marks awarded are based solely on the requirements as defined in the mark scheme. Marks should not be awarded with grade thresholds or grade descriptors in mind.

	Level 5 Compares big messages on prospects for the League i.e. both indicate that the prospects for the League are uncertain/not straightforward/problematic	7
	Level 4 Agreement AND disagreement of detail or sub-messages	6
	Level 3 Agreement OR disagreement of detail or sub-messages Possible agreements include: • League is very important to Wilson • British people supported the League • Lloyd George not keen on League • French liberals supported League • Doubts in US on powers of the League • Many Americans supported the League Possible disagreements include: • Clemenceau against the League in A, willing to give it a go in B • Lloyd George not attracted to idea of League in A, some attraction in B • Lloyd George finds Wilson's idea ludicrous in A, would go along with it in B	3–5

	Level 5 Reasons based on the purpose of the cartoon i.e. must include the intended outcome of the impact of the message on the audience. Award 8 marks if the purpose has specific contextual support.	7–8
	Level 4 Reasons based on the Big Message i.e. EITHER to say that the League will fail, despite its high aspirations OR the League will succeed, and has high aspirations (in either case, both elements of the message must be present)	5–6
	Level 3 Reasons based on explained context OR Level 3 Reasons based on a valid sub-message	3–4
	Level 2 Interprets cartoon or describes the context – but not used as a reason for publication	2

	Level 4 Reasons based on developed context i.e. on the French experience of the War, or what they expected to get out of the War	5

Source use must be reference to a source by letter, by provenance or by direct quote. There must be examples from source content. There must be an explanation of how this supports/does not support the statement. Use a ✓ in the margin for each source use in support of the statement and a ✗ for each source use rejecting the statement. (i.e. little/no support) ✓ – A, B, D, E, F, H (i.e. much support) ✗ – A, B, C, E, G
